Tablets for all

Univen made national history in the higher education sector when Vice Chancellor and Principal, Prof Peter Mbati, officially handed tablets to more than 13 000 students recently – an investment of R46m. The project enhances the quality of teaching and learning, empowering Univen's students to compete favourably. It also demonstrates the university's commitment to provide students with the necessary support to ensure that they realise their dreams with minimal challenges.

"Univen is a leader among tertiary institutions in providing this high end quality tablet pc-product to our students. I am confident that the tablets will translate into increased academic output in the short to medium term with increased graduation rates, success rates and research output," said Mhati

"The introduction of Univen's e-learning project, managed by the Centre for Higher Education, Teaching and Learning, headed by Dr Clever Ndebele, will provide oversight on the implementation and academic relevance of this tool for quality teaching and learning.

"The successful implementation of e-learning

requires among others, an excellent information and communication technology environment. For this we have developed a master plan for an ICT Smart Campus and an e-learning management system. The pilot phase for the roll out of e-learning in various schools is currently underway."

Mbati said there had also been an increase in bandwidth, which has grown over the years from

a mere eight mbps in 2008 to approximately 400 mbps today.

"This will grow ten-fold to approximately ten gigabits per second by the end of this year, due to a project funded by the Departments of Science and Technology and Higher Education and Training. The university has also provided Wi-Fi hot spots on campus," he said.

Univen community says no to xenophobic violence

Speakers at Univen's mass meeting against xenophobia at University Freedom Square were unanimous in condemning the recent attacks against foreigners in South Africa.

Deputy Vice Chancellor: Operations, Dr Jannie Zaaiman, Student Representative Council Deputy President, Noxolo Mbembe, Minister of Information, Mr Abel Mateta and Univen alumnus,

an employee at the European Union, Mr Brutus Malada all called on the university community to treat foreign nationals as fellow brothers and sisters.

"An African can never be called a foreigner in an African land – let's live in harmony," said Mbembe.

The Vice Chancellor and Principal, Prof Peter Mbati and his management team, staff and students all strongly condemned the xenophobic attacks on foreign nationals.

"Given our geographical location, we have attracted many students and experienced staff members with scarce skills from African countries. We therefore owe our existence to Africa" says Mhati

"We say no to xenophobic attacks on our fellow brothers and sisters from Africa. Univen shall remain a home to all Africans in pursuit of and provision of knowledge. The university celebrates diversity and we call upon all students and staff to embrace all Africans and live with them in peace. Let us also live up to the dream of Kwame Nkrumah of Africa as 'one continent, one people and one nation' by showing tolerance, respect, love and care to fellow Africans "

"Physical appearance has nothing to do with HIV and AIDS," says Unisa's Prof Helen Mavhandu-

Delivering the keynote address at the campus launch of the First thing First and TB campaign recently, Mavhandu-Mudzusi said that due to confidentiality, aspects such as non-disclosure, protection by the law, intentional spread and denial, HIV infection still increases despite all the information available.

"Stay away from myths related to HIV infection such as taking a shower after unprotected sex or sleeping with a virgin.

"Students must stay away from favours like free cash, cell phones, credit cards, cars, year marks and accommodation. An attitude of abstinence, faithfulness, circumcision and condomising pays well," said Mavhandu-Mudzusi.

Univen's Deputy Manager: TB, Mr Magosha, urged students and staff to take HIV testing seriously.

"The sooner you know the better. Disclose your status to people you know can support and protect you. Using drugs and alcohol increases the risk of HIV, increasing the risk to get involved in unsafe sexual activities."

The campaign was organised by Univen Campus Health in collaboration with the Vhembe Department of Health. The event was attended by students and staff who also tested for HIV and AIDS. The Univen Saint Engenenas performed at

Women academic leaders in higher education

A Doctor of Education in Education Management candidate, Ms Racheal Morake, successfully defended her thesis titled 'Living beyond the life histories of women academic leaders in higher education in South Africa' recently.

The specific thrust for her study is aimed at generating propositions that explain the South African context of leadership success - or lack thereof - experienced by women in top management in higher education. Her study aims to move beyond the barriers paradigm in social science scholarship through learning from these women's experiences, as it seeks to place policy as best practice or as inhibiting the advancement of women in higher education leadership.

Morake is a senior member of the Department of International Relations and Cooperation and is currently serving as head of mission administration at the South African Embassy in Italy.

Her career started as a high school teacher in 1993 and she moved through the ranks until she was appointed as head of a department at the then Medical University of Southern Africa (Medunsa), now the Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University. She worked in the area of academic development. She has done extensive work in the area of language for academic and specific purposes and has published in this area.

Her commitment to language education in general and foreign language education in the public sector in particular has earned her appreciation and acknowledgement from the French government as a recipient of the Order of the Academic Palms in 2012

As a rounded educator first and a diplomat second, she has participated in the historic popularisation of the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women. This saw the late President Nelson Mandela sign and ratify this UN instrument into law in 1995, following successful participation in the Dakar and Beijing conferences on women and development.

She has also done extensive work on girl child education. She coordinated the Africa Girls Scholarship Programme, formerly called the Education for Democracy and Development

Initiative in South Africa, initiated by former US President Bill Clinton and later President George Bush as the Africa Education Initiative. This programme was initially run only in Mpumalanga but was later expanded to other provinces such as the Eastern Cape.

As a developing leader, she believes that education especially for girls, is the first step towards opening opportunities into careers that have been historically regarded as the territory of the 'human' male. She is a strong believer in human rights and one of the courses she taught was on human diversity and how it impacts health care delivery.

Other than her doctoral studies, she has also evaluated a national programme for the Department of Labour sponsored by Gesellschaft fur Technische Zusammenarbeit, a German organisation for international technical cooperation, commissioned by the European Union.

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Univen and Wits take hands to enhance teaching and learning

Wits University's Vice Chancellor, Prof Adam Habib and Univen's Vice Chancellor and Principal, Prof Peter Mbati signed a memorandum of agreement on strategic cooperation in research and postgraduate studies, teaching and learning and community engagement recently.

"Although individual academics at these institutions are already collaborating with each other in some disciplines, this memorandum of agreement formalises and strengthens these efforts," says Habib.

"This initiative not only supports the strategic goals of Wits, Univen and the University of Limpopo, but also manifests the need for greater cooperation and collaboration between neighbouring higher education institutions, post-democracy.

"The partnership will focus on specific academic projects in the areas of engineering, health sciences, education, mathematics and social sciences. It will also include staff mentoring and capacity building, student exchanges and access to research and teaching facilities at Wits' rural campuses in Mpumalanga.

"This is an exciting project for Wits and speaks directly to our objectives of being a globally competitive and simultaneously, a locally responsive institution," said Habib.

"Univen strives to be a leading regional university with a strong service orientation to its community. This collaboration is an important initiative in not only achieving this objective, but continuing to grow our research base," says Mbati.

Both Habib and Mbati emphasised that partnerships between local universities are fundamental and one of the drivers of transformation in the higher education sector. This initiative makes more effective use of declining research and teaching resources and contributes to advancing South Africa's educational, economic and social development needs as promoted in the national development plan.

National Research Foundation comes to campus

Representatives of the National Research Foundation, including the Director: Institutional Engagement and Partnership Development, Dr Linda Mtwisha and the Director: Research Chairs and Centres of Excellence, Dr Thandi Mugwedi, recently visited Univen.

The purpose of the visit was to establish a university flagship programme.

Hosted by the Univen Director of Research and Innovation, Prof Ekosse, the Univen team included the Deputy Vice Chancellor: Academic, Prof Crafford, the Dean of the School of Mathematical and Natural Sciences, Prof Potgieter, the Dean of the School of Management Sciences, Prof Kadyamatimba and the heads of various departments and representatives from various schools.

Mtwisha informed Univen about the establishment of a new Directorate of Research and Innovation, Support and Advancement, tasked to establish strategic partnerships with public academic and research institutions.

"The directorate will assist in improving these institutions' research and innovation capacity and capabilities to increase production of high quality research and innovation outputs and outcomes. The aim is to allow institutions to identify a flagship in an area that will afford the institution a comparative advantage over other initiatives.

The National Research Foundation will provide financial support for the flagship initiative - however, institutional commitment to the initiative is also required," said Mtwisha.

"A strategy for Univen to initiate a flagship programme will be to align the research ideas with the existing niche projects and collaboration with strategic partners like government departments, other local universities and municipalities. Furthermore, the existing foundation-supported research projects can support the flagship programme, in addition to the multidisciplinary or transdisciplinary approach.

"Due to the varieties in flagship programmes that may be initiated, they will not follow the normal timelines and processes, but will obviously be monitored and evaluated. The programme can be up to 15 years or even beyond."

Univen's research productivity, which is monitored through Thompson Reuters, was also discussed. Univen produced 414 publications in five years – from 2010 to 2014. The number of citations was 726 with a 0.48 normalised citation impact when compared with other institutions in the same period. The total number of publications per subject comparison showed a high number of publications in Plant and Animal Science. Per subject comparison, the normalised citation impact was high in Mathematics.

Out of the 414 publications the author rankings were Prof Shateyi (12.72 percent), Prof Samie (8.19 percent), Prof Taylor (6.68 percent), Prof Bessong (6.03 percent), Prof Mammino (3.45 percent), Dr Gitari (3.23 percent and Dr Tshisikhawe (3.23 percent)

A dedicated Univen Research and Innovation and National Research Foundation team committed to further improving research at the university.

The workshop produced a service provider management policy, a PEST and SWOT analysis, redefined the duties of the Occupational Health and Safety committee and its officers' duties and also redefined the implementation of awareness programmes implementation. Other resolutions include the restructuring of support services and functionality, compensation of injury on duty and studies in the context of the higher education environment.

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World-renowned agro-ecologists visit Univen

Prof Teja Tscharntke and Dr Ingo Grass of the University of Göttingen recently visited Univen, courtesy of Univen's Chair on Biodiversity Value and Change.

It is part of the German-funded Limpopo Living Landscapes project. The head of Univen's Chair, Prof Peter Taylor, leads a sub-project 'Functional biodiversity'.

Tscharntke is listed by Thomson ISI's Web of Knowledge Essential Science Indicators as among the top 20 most-cited scientists worldwide in the field of environment/ecology.

Tscharntke and Grass visited macadamia orchards in the Levubu area to help design experiments to quantify the economic value of natural pollinators and insect pest predators like bats and birds. They met some of the local macadamia growers and local agricultural consultant, Dries Alberts. With Prof Stefan Foord, Head of the Zoology Department at Univen, they discussed collaborative research on pollination services of insects in small-holder mango farms. A Univen MSc student, Mr Terrence Maphote, supervised by Foord, is currently working on this project.

Together with Taylor, Tscharntke and Grass will co-supervise two German PHD students, Ms Sina Weier and Valerie Linden, who recently registered at Univen

Tscharntke also delivered a public lecture at Univen's School of Mathematical and Natural Sciences, on conservation in tropical agro-ecosystems: biodiversity and ecosystem services. He highlighted

the inestimable value of ecosystem services in tropical agro-ecosystems and the negative impacts of environmental degradation on global human food security.

"Linking agricultural intensification with biodiversity conservation and hunger reduction requires well-informed regional and targeted solutions, something which the land sparing vs sharing debate has failed to achieve so far," he said.

Hopefully the research with Tscarntke's group will not only boost research and postgraduate output at Univen, but will shed valuable insights into the value of natural ecosystem services in commercial and small-holder farming systems in the Vhembe Biosphere Reserve.

Ways to conserve biodiversity to maximise these services in the face of climate change will hopefully also be determined.
