

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# **UNIVEN warmly welcomes** first entering students

On Monday, 03 February 2020, the University of Venda (UNIVEN) held its Official Opening of the 2020 Orientation Programme to ease the transition and familiarise first entering students with Campus and University life. The Official Opening of Orientation took place in the University Auditorium.



In his official opening address, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor Academic, Prof Jan Crafford said that this is one of the most important days for the University to welcome students who will be with the University for the coming three (3) to four (4) years, except if they will be doing their postgraduate degrees here at UNIVEN

"You have successfully passed your matric and you are now members of a selected group of the South African population that only contributes less than five percent of the population of the country. It is therefore important to remind you that the University has only one source of income, which is student fees which are being paid by either NSFAS, sponsors, family members or bursaries. However, there is a government subsidy where the University gets a certain amount of money for enrolling a certain percentage of students while another percentage of money is given when students complete their studies on time." Prof Crafford further advised students to make use of the services offered at UNIVEN because a large amount of money has been invested in the education system to ensure that they get such services. He welcomed first time entering students to UNIVEN and wished them well in their academic journey.



In his welcome remarks, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor Operations, Dr Robert Martin said UNIVEN prides itself with a good service that it offers to its students and for delivering its mandate of teaching and learning, research and community engagement in a professional manner, not only for South Africans but also for students from other countries. Dr Martin advised first time entering students not to stay at the UNIVEN for 10 to 15 years before they could complete their studies. "Make use of the services available to assist you to complete your studies within stipulated time

## Five UNIVEN students participated at the Impact Africa Social Entrepreneurship Summit

The summit promoted partnerships to accelerate social innovations to Africa's most pressing challenges by inspiring and connecting social entrepreneurs, changemakers, investors, and other ecosystem stakeholders across Africa. The theme centred on Collaborative finance for social innovation and how to catalyse social innovation in Africa.

The summit, which was held at the Kenya Monetary School, Nairobi from 04 - 05 December 2019, drew speakers and delegates from across the world. Amongst others were government ministers, commissioners, directors and head of departments as well as directors and managers of private multinational companies and stakeholders from Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs).

The objectives were twofold: Firstly, to discuss the future financing models for social innovation and secondly, a framework for social innovation.

We learnt a lot about the contradiction between enterprise potential funders and prospective/existing entrepreneurs. Whereas funders seem to have a lot to invest, there are limited innovations on one hand and apparent lack of funding on the other hand. Deliberations centred around establishing the missing link and African centred solutions. Standardization was another key discussion issue. Often, funders use foreign models to administer support to African entrepreneurs in Africa. The students were excited and indicated that they were grateful for the experiences. Some of the key reflective points are as follows:

- Thank you UNIVEN for such a great exposure. We wish more students could get more exposure and opportunities like this.
- We got an opportunity to see the bigger picture, to network and to understand

how social entrepreneurship and the flow of money works.

- We learnt a lot about the need for a collaborative spirit: like they said, "If you want to go fast, go alone but if you want to go far, then go with others". This is selfexplanatory and a vital resource.
- We have to make opportunities and not wait for them to find us.
- I learnt not to take no for an answer and that I should keep pressing until I get to my goal.

#### Top 5 lessons learnt at the summit that could be useful to other students:

- Just because you are locally based does not mean you cannot think globally. You must always be ready for expansion outside your territory and venture to international grounds and partnerships.
- 2) It is important to do research about your line of business, know what you represent and the social impact that drives you thereof. There are so many businesses similar to yours out there, what value makes yours stand out?
- 3) If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together. It is paramount to make collaborative partnerships because if we want to sustain the impact then no man can do it alone, we need each other for even greater social impact.
- 4) There are many funding opportunities and investors out there but is your enterprise funding ready? Your proposal needs to speak to the investors' objectives and have a clear profit- making plan of action.
- 5) Money does not come alone, it is guided by rules and principles that you can't change. Does your business enterprise have value for money?

#### **Further reflections**

This whole summit was an eye opener for me because the topics that were discussed apply for both different organizations and institutions, including our University as an institution and the projects being run in the University. One of the lessons that stood out for me was the accountability and transparency topic which was discussed in one of the break-away sessions. Accountability and transparency are something that many organizations and institutions don't have. It will be a good thing for the University of Venda to revise its policies and emphasize on being accountable and taking responsibility for every objective, which could lead to good running of the institution and its projects, so says Lutendo.

Dedication is one of the key attitudes that people need to have when they are working towards achieving a greater goal, I picked this up when I had conversations with people who are part of both the British council as well as those that are Ashoka fellows. I was inspired by the amount of dedication they all put in towards making sure that the event becomes a success. To them it doesn't matter what kind of position they hold or what's in it for them, but all that matters is that the event must happen in a successful manner. To have this kind of spirit and zeal, is something that we also need to adopt , not only as the Community Engagement Directorate, but also at the entire University community, said lustice

Some of the outstanding achievements that stood out for me from coca cola is their newly created program that aims to fund 5 000 women by 2020. The panel gave few recommendations, amongst others was that the education systems in both countries must introduce social entrepreneurship in schools and develop design thinking from young age.

Readiness of entrepreneurs to take advantage of funding opportunities was another thorny discussion. We learnt that an individual may have an innovative idea but fail to secure funding because it is not scalable, viable or sustainable.

It was also emphasized that before looking for funding, there is a need to make sure that the business plan has a market segment which is accessible.

# Increase in UNIVEN NRF Rated Researchers

In 2020, University of Venda (UNIVEN) has four newly National Research Foundation (NRF) rated researchers and two renewed NRF rated researchers. It should be recalled that UNIVEN submitted 11 applications of which six were successful. The new 2020 NRF rated researchers are as follows:

- Prof Ademola O. Jegede, School of Law, obtained a C2 rating;
- Dr Nikita Tawanda Tavengwa, School of Mathematical and Natural Sciences, got a Y2 rating;
- Dr Joshua Edokpayi, School of Environmental Sciences, had a Y2 rating; and
- Dr Emma Charlene Lubaale, School of Law, obtained a Y2 rating.

With the additional four colleagues becoming NRF rated, it brings the number of NRF rated researchers at UNIVEN to 29.

Table 1 gives the names and categories of our current NRF rated researchers at UNIVEN.

The University has one B3; four C1; eight C2; ten C3; and six Y2 rated researchers.

From 2013 to date, UNIVEN has lost over ten NRF rated researchers. Last year, we lost three NRF rated researchers to other institutions.


In the previous years we had also lost a sizable number of rated researchers due to retirements, contracts coming to an end, or gaining employment elsewhere.

remains to make research at UNIVEN a pivot around which all academic activities must revolve. According to Senior Professor GE Ekosse, Director of Research and Innovation, "Research is only complete when it is disseminated, shared and recognized as new knowledge. Rated researchers always strive to do so."

# Muano Nemavhidi selected for Abe Bailey Trust and Travel Bursary

Ms Muano Nemavhidi from the School of Law, studying Bachelor of Law at the University of Venda was selected for Abe Bailey. The Travel bursary took place from the 26 November – 21 December 2019 and it started in Cape Town where everyone was informed about what was expected of them throughout the trip and created an open atmosphere for engagement and getting acquainted with the other bursars. On the 27th – 30th of November 2019 bursars arrived in Ethiopia, Addis Ababa where they were equipped with knowledge of the current state of Africa as well as the plans to transform it. From the 30th November to 21 December 2019, the selected bursars went to London then to Scotland where they did different activities including numerous sites visits.

Applicants must understand that this is a Travel Bursary which demands a different skill set from the criteria of a normal bursary. The Trustees are looking for applicants who have an ability to listen, to express an opinion, possess an enquiring mind, want to broaden their horizons and above all wish to keep learning. Successful bursars need to enjoy working with people, to exude a positivity and enthusiasm which raises the energy levels of those around them.

The Abe Bailey Trust and the Travel Bursary was established in terms of the Will of Sir Abe Bailey who died in 1940. The Trustees of the Abe Bailey Trust make funds available for travel bursaries known as the Abe Bailey Travel Bursaries. These Travel Bursaries give selected university students and university staff of Junior Lecturer status an opportunity to visit the United Kingdom. The focus of the Abe Bailey Trust is leadership development and the Trustees wish the bursaries to be awarded to persons who are academically strong and have shown exceptional qualities of leadership and service, with a good track record not only on campus but also in a wider social context and who are able to function as part of a select and highly skilled group.

This travel bursary was founded for South African students to visit Britain and meet the following objectives to effect greater co-operation and understanding of different viewpoints and opinions among those with various language and cultural backgrounds. To encourage leadership that demonstrates open debate and mutual respect of others. To enable outstanding South African students who show exceptional leadership and a strong service ethic to experience British culture and participate in an interactive programme and examine its significance in the context of South African history. To foster enterprise, commitment and effective participation in a common future as well as to promote South African unity.

# Post-graduate study should be driven by intentionality

The School of Human and Social Sciences held its first progress review workshop for their post-graduate students, supervisors and promoters. The workshop took place over three days commencing Tuesday, 10 until Thursday, 12 December 2019 at 2Ten Hotel. A total of 50 participants consisting of staff members and Post-Graduate students, attended the Workshop.



When officially opening the workshop, Advocate Dr Pfarelo Matshidze, Vice-Dean of the School of Human and Social Sciences, highlighted that through the workshop, the School aims at encouraging a progressive attitude through learning of good habits and unlearning some of the bad habits generally committed by students in their research pursuit.



Sharing the purpose of the workshop, the School of Human and Social Sciences Research Professor Mashudu Mashige, expressed that the workshop aims at instilling a change in attitude in both supervisors and supervisees. "By deciding to attend the workshop, it shows you have an intention to complete your study and that the study will make an impact in someone's life or at least a community implicated in the research", said Prof Mashige. "Candidates should not be begged to complete their studies by supervisors and promoters; it should come out of their own intentionality", continued Prof Mashige.

A three-day workshop provided both supervisors and post-graduate students an opportunity to share their experiences in the course of preparing proposals and conducting research. On the first day, students were divided into four groups in terms of the stages they are, providing them an opportunity to share experiences and challenges. Students and supervisors also engaged in a robust discussion relating to issues that should be considered to make post-graduate study effective and avoid annoying each other which leads to accusations and counter-accusations, both of which are unnecessary.

- Need for frequently conducting workshops of this nature in the future
- In order to enhance quality, frequent article publishing workshops should be conducted.



Feedback reports by groups to the plenary One of the concerns raised over postgraduate studies was the lack of a sense of commitment. It was emphasized that there should be a programme agreed and committed to, by both the supervisor/ promoter and the student. A call was made for bridges to be mended where relations are almost at an advanced aggravated state. As part of enhancing these relations, the School of Human and Social Sciences is finalizing a booklet which will soon be published, amongst others, post-graduate students will be required to sign an agreement with their supervisors and promoters.

During the workshop, the challenge of technology was discussed in the view of the effects of the 4th Industrial Revolution. It was agreed that opportunities should be taken to better research development through the use of technology in the 4th Industrial Revolution The workshop involved several presenters sharing skills in the writing of proposals as well as writing up dissertations and theses. The bane of plagiarism and wanton disregard for ethics in research were also discussed.

The workshop was also attended by the Traditional Healers' chairperson, Mr Masia who presented on the importance of Indigenous Knowledge systems.

Post-graduate students benefitted a lot from the workshop and in their feedback, it was expressed that the student ownership of the process becomes important, and that supervisors' comments should be taken into consideration and implemented in full if the study is to be successful. As portrayed by Nelisiwe Mondlane, a Masters of Arts student who believes that "the workshop was helpful to the students as it relates to our research projects and provided guidance. It will be important to hold such workshops in the future as it helps to improve student progress in their research projects"

## Preparing UNIVEN Researchers to become National Research Foundation Rated Researchers

University of Venda under the auspices of the Directorate of Research and Innovation (DRI) organised a half day workshop to prepare researchers who are interested in becoming NRF Rated. The workshop took place at UNIVEN Research Conference Centre on the 16th January 2020. It was facilitated by the NRF Director of Reviews and Evaluation - Ms Joyce Olivier, who was assisted by the Professional Officer of the NRF Reviews and Evaluation – Ms Gomotsegang Monaise. The Research Coordinator in DRI – Dr ON Sotshangane was tasked with the organisation of the workshop.

In his opening remarks, the Director Research and Innovation - Senior Professor GE Ekosse, gave the history of growth of NRF Rated Researchers at UNIVEN from 2008 - 2019. In 2008, UNIVEN had only one Rated Researcher. With regular annual growth, in 2019 there were 29 UNIVEN NRF Rated Researchers. This number would have been about 40 had it not been for deaths, resignations and retirements. Importantly, Rated Researchers contribute immensely to university core business particularly in academic leadership, postgraduate supervision, journal articles publications, and related research outputs released through various dissemination outlets. It is disappointing though that the

number of Female Rated Researchers at UNIVEN has not increased from four over the years. That notwithstanding, there is an on-going Customised NRF Assisted Project in which staff in DRI are working with UNIVEN female researchers in assisting with their career growth and development.

The NRF Director of Reviews and Evaluation, Ms Joyce Olivier, spoke extensively on the NRF Rating and Evaluation System. She highlighted the processes and procedures to be adhered to and pointed out common pitfalls which should be avoided by prospective applicants. The workshop had an interactive session in which UNIVEN researchers asked many questions on aspects of how to become rated. Attendees were encouraged to complete their applications online for the 2020 NRF Evaluation and Rating submissions which is closing on the 31 January 2020 internally. She pointed out that all people affiliated with NRF recognised institutions, whether permanently employed researchers/academics or fixed term contract researchers are eligible to apply for evaluation and rating. Prospective applicants are advised to develop a clear focus and avoid supporting predatory publishers. More information is available at http://www.nrf. acza/rating

The ceremony was officiated by Dr Segun Obadire, Acting Director International Relations, UNIVEN. According to the signed




