## BANKSETA invests R68 million Read inside in capacity building

Univen, in collaboration with its key partners the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) and the BANKSETA launched a R68 million capacity building project to ensure that the university receives SAICA accreditation.

The project will run over four years. It enables Univen to offer a fouryear BCom Accounting Sciences degree in the Department of Accounting, while concurrently maintaining teaching and learning standards which are consistent with the demands of the chartered accountancy profession.

Started in January last year, the initial intake was 50 students, whose study costs are borne by the Thuthuka bursary fund. To date the number of first and second year students is 147. The University of Johannesburg serves as mentor for the programme until it is

Univen's Vice Chancellor and Principal, Prof Peter Mbati, said with this qualification the university will play a significant role and contribute towards transformation by producing those world-class charted accountants who are desperately needed in South Africa.

"This particularly applies to Limpopo and the Southern African Development Community. The university has established many partnership initiatives and programmes with government agencies and the private sector to produce skills needed for rural and regional development in

"Currently there is a shortage and demand for skilled accounting professionals in all business sectors, both in the public and private sectors. The capacity building project will not only equip more students with better finance skills, but it will also assist in providing organisations with skilled and qualified leaders," he said.

SAICA's Advisory Council member and the Thuthuka Bursary Fund Chairman, Sizwe Nxasana, said through this project, 350 learners will gain

access to a high-quality undergraduate degree programme with international recognition.

"We are hoping to produce a new breed of chartered accountants who are willing to plough back in their communities to make a difference. We want to build a brand new team of responsible leaders who are successful and add value to society. The new generation of leaders should be significant rather than merely successful. They should be leaders who make a significant impact

It is hoped that by 2018. Univen would have developed the necessary capacity required to seek SAICA accreditation for the new degree. Once this is achieved, the university will join other SAICA accredited institutions from historically disadvantaged universities such as the University of Limpopo and of Fort Hare. The Walter Sisulu University and University of Zululand are undergoing similar capacity building programmes from SAICA. BANKSETA Company Secretary: Governance, Caroline King, said the project further positions the country's workforce capacity strategy with the ever-changing demands in the job market for skilled individuals.

"We are committed to the transformation of the key professions like accounting and actuarial science that support our sector. For us to reach communities such as Venda is a fulfilling exercise, as it assists us to pervasively build a case for skills development in the communities that really need

"We are honoured to have partnered and invested in the project and look forward to the project attaining its objectives and making a profound impact," she said.

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The University of Johannesburg's Prof Amanda Dempsey said the university is a critical partner and provides strategic support and guidance to Univen staff.

"Students will study towards a four-year BCom Accounting Sciences degree at Univen and their Certificate in Theory of Accounting at the University of Johannesburg." On behalf of the students, Thuthuka beneficiary second-year student, Litshani Tshiruruvhela said the project touched, changed and transformed his life in so many ways.

"Being with Thuthuka has been the best academic reward that has come my way so far, both in the lecture room and off campus. Thuthuka has set aside our different backgrounds and given us the platform to academically compete as equals," he said.

## Univen embraces homosexuality

South Africa's constitution is the first in Africa to prohibit unfair discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation.

Constitutionally this guarantees equality for gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI) people, including heterosexual men who have sex with other men and heterosexual women who have sex with other women.

Despite the progressive constitution of South Africa, negative attitudes towards the LGBTI community still exist, leaving many of them with psychological wounds and scars. This ranges from verbal, emotional and physical abuse and harassment. It also includes discrimination in housing and employment and access to quality health services, forced heterosexual relationships, corrective rape and sexual orientation conversion interventions.

LGBTI and gender non-conforming persons who are victims and those who have observed sexual orientation and gender identity-based violence, seldom find comfort in revealing their true identity to themselves and to their family and friends. This is either because of fear, as heterosexuality is seen as a normal way of living, or because their families and friends join in their stigmatisation or discrimination.

Univen's Campus Health Services has established a programme for LGBTI and heterosexual men who have sex with other men and heterosexual women who have sex with other women to address issues related to sexual diversity.

The programme creates a conducive and empowering environment for such people, provides an opportunity for the university community to discuss sexual diversity and understand the life experiences of sexual minorities and to provide targeted HIV/AIDS prevention communication.

Semakaleng Mothapo, Univen's LGBTI programme coordinator, says as a result of homophobia, LGBTI persons are more likely to commit suicide than

"Be kind to LGBTI persons and straight men and

woman who have sexual relations with persons of the same sex. Show you care by getting to know your LGBTI classmates and staff. When someone tells you they are attracted to persons of the same sex, tell them they are still the same person to you as before and thank them for trusting you with such personal information.

"Don't condone jokes which make fun of sexual minorities or insults that demean and belittle them. Insults and mean jokes are not funny," says

#### New Early Childhood Education student exchange scheme

The Department of Early Childhood Education at Univen's School of Education has established a new Early Childhood Education student exchange scheme

The exchange is a tripartite partnership with the Catholieke University Leuven and Limburg in Belgium and the Cape Peninsula University of Technology.

In the first semester, two groups of exchange students of four students each, from the Belgian partner, visited Univen. Each group participated in teaching practice in local schools for two months.

To strengthen and further develop the student exchange, delegations from the two partners also visited the schools where the students were placed for teaching practice. These included the Mvudi and Tshedza Primary School and the Fulufhelo Special School for the Mentally Handicapped in Thohoyandou.

It was agreed at a stakeholder workshop that the exchange students from Univen and the Cape Peninsula University of Technology should always travel to Belgium together. The Department of Early Childhood Education's best performing student,

Phineas Mutavhatsindi, delivered a motivational talk, saying that his success can be attributed to his commitment to his studies and him spending long hours in his library cubicle. He encouraged students to choose friends who support them in their studies.

"The university is a community with many extramural activities. However, it is paramount to put academic activities first."

Based on his academic merit, Mutavhatsindi has been selected as the first Early Childhood Education student to participate in the outgoing part of the student exchange. He will travel to Belgium soon.

# Transforming the heritage landscape

"Government seeks urgent solutions to transform our heritage, to create space to reflect on the current state of our heritage and mechanisms towards an inclusive reflection of the country's diversity."

So said the Deputy Director General of the Department of Arts and Culture, Mr Ndima, at a Univen dialogue – an initiative by the Minister of Arts and Culture, Nathi Mthethwa, after the mayhem caused by students at the University of Cape Town who demanded the removal of Cecil John Rhodes' statue.

The dialogue was also attended by the Limpopo MEC of Sport, Arts and Culture, Nandi Ndalane, representatives of South African Heritage, the National Heritage Council Chief Executive Officer, Adv Sonwabile Mangcotywa, the Mayor of Thulamela, Vho Thovhele Masia and Univen staff and students.

Ndalane said that the dialogue will solve the current problems with regard to name changes, naming of statues and offensive names that remained for a long time.

"Due to frustrations, people express themselves differently, illegally or unlawfully. As leadership we need to channel that anger, frustration and excitement to benefit the transformation route.

"It is important to find a way to tell people and let them see that their differences are a point to come together, a point of unity, rather than deadly differences. We need to become inclusive in the spirit of participatory democracy.

"We need to find the current unifying symbols that bring a young population together. Change is painful and at times there will be resistance and stubbornness, but that should give us impetus to be more transforming and inclusive in the hope for a better future," said Ndalane.

"We need to differentiate between heritage and history," said the Chief Executive Officer of the National Heritage Council, Adv Sonwabile Mangcotywa.

"Destruction of statues is not a solution but we should rather find ways that will unify us." In response to the discussion, students opposed the destruction of statues.

"The statues should be kept in a place where everyone can have access and be reflective of the past. It is our history and our heritage, therefore destruction of statues is not a solution," said the students.

## Transforming Farmer's day at Univen

More than 60 farmers attended a farmer's day at Univen's School of Agriculture

Welcomed by the Head of the Department of Crop Production, Prof Ogola, delegates visited the experimental farm where they attended an information session and demonstration on how to farm cassava successfully. It included planting, management, pest and disease control, soil factors, harvesting and post harvesting techniques and storage. Information about the health benefits and the various uses of cassava formed part of the session.

Farmers were then treated to a tasting session of different dishes, made from both the cassava root and cassava leaves. This included cassava snacks, which are a healthier substitute to potato crisps because of their low glycaemic index nature (release glucose more slowly and steadily) and fried cassava

Cassava has nearly twice the calories than that of potatoes and is very low in fats and protein. Nonetheless, it has more protein than that of other tropical food sources like yam, potato and plantains. As in other roots and tubers, cassava too is free from gluten. Gluten-free starch is used in special food preparations for celiac disease patients.

Young, tender cassava leaves are a good source of dietary proteins and vitamin K. Vitamin K plays a role in bone mass building by promoting osteotrophic activity in bones. It also has a role in the treatment of Alzheimer's disease patients by limiting neuronal damage in the brain. Cassava is a moderate source of some of the valuable B-complex group of vitamins such as folates, thiamin, pyridoxine (vitamin B-6), riboflavin and pantothenic acid.

It is also one of the chief sources of important minerals like zinc, magnesium, copper, iron and manganese for many inhabitants in the tropical belts. It has adequate amounts of potassium (271 mg per 100g or 6% of RDA).

Potassium is an important component of cell and body fluids that help regulate heart rate and blood pressure. It is therefore important for poor communities to grow this variety for its contribution to nutrition.


