DHET Bursary scheme allowances for contact university students in 2019

The table below provides an indication of the R-amounts for the different categories of allowances applicable to **contact students for the 2019** academic year who are on the DHET bursary scheme

DHET Grant allowances for contact students in 2019

Senior students on the DHET grant (students subject to the R122K family income threshold) receive allowances subject to the funding cap of R88 600.

The living, incidental and learning material allowances are at least equal to the allowances indicated in the above table. As was the case in 2018, where the allowances provided to students in 2017 were already greater than the bursary scheme allowances detailed in the above table, these must not be increased.

The transport allowances for these students can be increased by a maximum of 5.3%, as long as they do not exceed the maximum amounts of R10 000.
