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UNIVEN hosts the 3rd Strategic Read inside Risk Leadership Conversations on Higher Education Conference for the First time



Institutions of higher learning and organisations from different spectrums, convened for the first time at the University of Venda for a Two - Day Hybrid Conference under the theme 'Risk-based transformative leadership strategies for excellence and innovation in the Higher Education Sector. This prestigious occasion was graced by the presence of world-class strategic leaders who shared their enlightening insights, thoughts, best practices, challenges, and most fundamentally the transformative strategies that have and will undoubtedly continue to shape risk leadership excellence in promoting the future we envisage.

The conference that was officially opened by the University of Venda Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Dr Bernard Nthambeleni, took place at the University Auditorium from 30 November 2022 to 01 December 2022. UNIVEN is the third institution to host this remarkable conference



The Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Dr Bernard Nthambeleni said the success of any conference is dependent upon the calibre of speakers, the level of engagement and the quality of papers presented. "I do not doubt that this conference will be a great success." The Vice-Chancellor and Principal saw this as an opportune moment for the University of Venda to host a conference of this magnitude. Dr Nthambeleni found the theme of the conference very relevant for a University that is celebrating 40 years of

UNIVEN has matured and has weathered a few storms in the past. Dr Nthambeleni highlighted that "the road we have travelled may have been foggy at times, meandering and marked by long detours of hardships and steep hills. The fog, the dust, the curves, and the hills, may have obscured our vision in our teens. However, all of that has been wiped out by lived experiences. Our destiny is clear, and our goal is nothing short of

He informed the delegates that the University commenced its Enterprise Risk management journey in 2019 with the full understanding that "risks and opportunities, strategy, business model, performance and sustainable development are all inseparable elements of the value creation process". This required an approach to ensure that UNIVEN's strategy, performance and risk management were aligned and integrated.

Dr Nthambeleni went on to say that "we are fully aware that risk maturity is not an event but a journey towards the full integration of Enterprise Risk Management in all activities. processes, and planning. Most importantly it is the cultural change to become a risk-aware organisation where all decision-making is based on sound risk intelligence and an awareness of the integrated nature of risk."

"UNIVEN is committed to ensuring that Enterprise Risk management continues to play its critical role in ensuring that we deliver on our credo "Creating Future Leaders," added the Vice-Chancellor and Principal. The environment in which higher education operates is very fluid, characterised by a plethora of external and internal risk factors. He alluded that "Whilst the external risks are very common and cut across all institutions, the extent to which institutions grapple and cope with some of these risks is dependent on historical factors."

Dr Nthambeleni further pointed out that the economic outlook of the country has an impact on the risks we encounter. The country's credit ratings affect the institutions of higher learning as well. "We are part of the global community and need to assist each other in surviving challenges. The deflecting resources of our students who depend on NSFAS to fund their studies. We need to be active to strengthen the throughput of our graduates."

He spoke of another major external risk that we face which is the quality of the students we receive from the schooling system. Most students come to universities underprepared to cope with the demands of higher learning. Their chances of success are very limited with a high number of them dropping out or taking longer to complete their studies. This risk can manifest itself in low throughput rates, which in turn, affect our funding and subsidies from the government.

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
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UNIVEN hosts the 3rd Strategic Risk Leadership Conversations on Higher Education continued...



When setting the tone, the Chief Risk Officer from the Durban University of Technology, Mr Sikhuthali Nyangintsimbi said this is the 3rd Higher Education Institution to host a conference of this calibre. "We saw it fit to be hosted by UNIVEN because of the 40th anniversary". He spoke of how the deliberations of this conference will help build a database for mentors for mentorship that is required. It is about us deliberately elevating our conversation, and deepening our deliberations," highlighted Mr Nyangintsimbi.



The Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) was represented by the Chief Director for Higher Education Policy and Research, Mr. Mahlubi "Chief" Mabizela. He spoke on the topic Evolution of University systems in South Africa: Lessons for the future. Mr Mabizela said change is the only constant in life.

The Executive Dean of the Faculty of Management, Commerce and Law, Prof Modimowabarwa Kanyane was the Chair of Session of panel 1, where the panellists consisted of Prof Jan Crafford, Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Teaching and Learning (UNIVEN); Prof Francis Petersen, Rector and Vice-Chancellor (UFS) who joined virtually and Dr Britta Zawada, Director Institutional Audits (CHE) who was also on the virtual platform, addressed the topic Strategies in Curriculum Change and processes for improved graduateness. Both members of the panel presented on respective aspects of the curriculum change and graduateness. Of critical importance was the concern about outdated curricula in the institutions of learning that needed to change or be renewed to align with the job market. After the panel members' presentations, Prof Kanyane in his capacity as Chair of the session raised a 'big question' about why there is a high level of unemployed graduates which is a cause for concern in the country. The session took another turn to labour on decoloniality and decolonisation of the curriculum to respond to the dynamics of the education landscape and the job market.

This was followed by panel 2 where the panellists presented on Managing Risks and Vulnerabilities Associated with Linkages, Partnerships and Internationalisation. The panellists were Mr Wiseman Jack, President International Education Association of South Africa (IEASA); Prof. Nonceba Mbambo-Kekana, Director of International Affairs, University of Limpopo and Dr Lavern Samuels, Director of International Education and Partnerships, University of Technology, elected President of IEASA and Ms Orla Quinlan, Director Internationalisation, Rhodes University, The panel was chaired by Mr Thabo Dikgale, Partnership Officer, International Relations,



On the virtual platform was Ms Nejolla Korris, the CEO of Interveritas International, USA International Speaker, who took the conference by the toes when presenting about "Words Never Lie but People Do; Detecting Deception in Everyday Communications." The presentation was quite interesting, informative and vibrant. It was found that lying is one of the biggest risk factors for leadership.

Day one of the conference was closed by the University of Venda's Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Research and Postgraduate Studies, Prof Nosisi Feza. "If we want to make sure that higher education keeps leading, we must stop encouraging lies", says Prof Feza."

The first day was also blessed by the presence of the Mayor of Thulamela Municipality, Cllr Sarah Rambuda.

Mr Julius Mojapelo, CEO Institute of Internal Auditors South Africa (IIASA), and Mr Kganki Matabane, CEO of Black Business Council presented on the Collapse of the SA Economy as a Reality: Impact and Options for Higher Education Institutions.

Panel 4 was chaired by Dr Lawrence Diko-Makia, Senior Lecturer Department of Earth Sciences, UNIVEN. Members of the panel, Mr Tonderai Makoni, Programme coordinator Vhembe Biosphere Reserve and Dr Christopher Whittle, Associate Director: Governance and Risk. PKF Octagon addressed the topic of Environmental Stewardship and Governance.



In addressing the topic of Aligning Risk Management with Research Strategy to Enhance Research Outputs for Innovation and Impact was UNIVEN's Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Research and Postgraduate Studies. Prof Nosisi Feza. She spoke of aligning risk management with a research strategy to enhance research output for innovation and impact. Prof Feza further talked of research and innovation being the knowledge generated by research as the basis of sustainable development which requires that knowledge be placed at the service of development, be converted into applications and be shared to ensure widespread benefits. She further emphasised the point of financial management for quality productivity. She said research space is facing the reality of scarcity of funds.

The Director of Internal Audit and Risk, UNIVEN, Mrs Diana Makwarela chaired the session that addressed the topic Risk-Based Transformative Leadership Strategies. Mr Christopher Palm who is the Chief Risk Advisor, at the Institute of Risk Management South Africa (IRMSA) presented the Global risk update, on the other hand, Dr Levy Ndou, a Political Analyst and Lecturer, at Tshwane University of Technology briefly highlighted Excellence and innovation in the Higher Education Sector, while Mr Phillip Rakgwale, President of South African Institute of Government Auditors (SAIGA) shared the Information Systems Risks and Data Ethics Risk factor with the participants.

UNIVEN Vice-Chancellor advises graduates to remain ethical in their conduct and abhor bribery and corruption

Thursday, 10 November 2022 was a joyous day as the University staff, students' guardians, and different sponsors and stakeholders gathered at the University Auditorium to celebrate the achievements of UNIVEN graduates. This graduation ceremony was held as part of the University of Venda's 40th-anniversary celebration. During the winter graduation ceremony on 14 and 15 July, 3 314 students graduated, and in this spring graduation ceremony, the University celebrated the success of 366 graduates which brings the total of 2022 graduates to 3 680, which is the highest number of graduates at UNIVEN in a single year. The graduates received their degrees from the faculties of Health Sciences; Humanities, Social Sciences, and Education; Management, Commerce and Law as well as Science, Engineering and Agriculture. During the November graduation ceremony, 19 doctoral degrees were conferred, and half of the 19 doctoral degrees were conferred



The Deputy Vice-Chancellor Teaching and Learning, Prof Jan Crafford said "UNIVEN is a University where women lead and show the way, watch the space". He said this when welcoming the guests during the UNIVEN November graduation ceremony. When rendering the purpose of the event, Khosi Vho-TN Shavhani said the purpose of the event was to honour leaders who have made a mark in other people's lives locally and globally. "We are gathered here to honour scholars for their outstanding works." He said this is a great moment of its kind. It is his majesty's wish that it is not your aptitude that determines your future but your attitude that will lead you towards achieving your goals. Nothing is impossible with God. This was the first time the Tshivhase Royal house was hosting that kind of event.

UNIVEN, the World Food Programme, and Department of Agriculture and Rural Development commit to fight hunger through Rural Transformation

The University of Venda (UNIVEN), World Food Programme (WFP) and Limpopo Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (LDARD) jointly hosted a Food Security Information Day under the theme 'Fighting hunger through rural transformation'. The event was held at the UNIVEN Sport Hall where smallholder farmers were given an opportunity to display and sell their fresh and processed produce. Stalls were set up outside though they extended all the way into the foyer of the Sport Hall. The major highlight of the day was the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between UNIVEN and the WFP.



The Acting Executive Dean of the Faculty of Science, Engineering and Agriculture Prof Jude Julius Owuor Odhiambo was the Programme Director during this event. He stressed that the Information Day was organised to showcase the interrelated roles that the university plays and establish how, collaborating with other key players, it could contribute to the attainment of food security in our country.



keynote address on behalf of the World Food Programme Regional Director for Southern Africa. He revealed that it was an immense privilege for the WFP to partner with UNIVEN, which was celebrating its 40th birthday. He highlighted that the event presented the WFP with a rare opportunity to discuss with UNIVEN, which is rural area-based, and work together to address the food and nutrition security threats facing Southern Africa. "Food production is one of the most important challenges for everyone." This challenge is partly due to the fact that there has never been much progress in addressing the nagging issue of land availability. Africa is the biggest continent in the world and should be making land readily available for farmers. As Africans, we need to address our challenges. We need to be determined in dealing with hunger within our continent. Food security is everyone's business. Over the last year, the WFP had the opportunity to meet key stakeholders to discuss the issue of food security.



Welcoming guests during the briefing session, the UNIVEN Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Dr Bernard Nthambeleni reiterated UNIVEN's deep commitment to dealing with sustainability issues. "As a University, we assume relevance when our work impacts communities and societies positively." Dr Nthambeleni noted that the theme of the Food Security Information Day was well aligned with what UNIVEN does on a daily basis. "The University belongs to the communities. Let us work together to change the dire situation our people find themselves in," he added.



Cllr Avhashoni Tshifhango, representing Vhembe District Municipality, said the District and Local Municipalities were prepared to work hard to make land available for those who want to cultivate it. This would enable local people to effectively fight poverty. Cllr Tshifhango said the Covid-19 pandemic, which worsened food scarcity, affected every country in the world. He indicated that the war between Ukraine and Russia made the situation even worse. "Today as we speak, food prices are extremely high due to skyrocketing fuel prices caused by the war in Ukraine. We have many emerging farmers here who need support for them to produce better. They are doing a lot and we have to give them the necessary support. Entering the market is also another challenge that confronts smallholder farmers. The issue of water worsens the challenges that the farmers face." Cllr Tshifhango promised that Municipalities would play their roles with the aim of ensuring that the challenges were addressed.

Mr Hlalanathi Fundzo, the Special Advisor to the WFP Director for the Southern African Region said that the World Food Programme wanted to make sure that everyone had enough food to eat every day. "No one should go to bed hungry. That is why we are partnering with UNIVEN to address the challenge of food scarcity. We are here to make sure that we reinforce harmony as we confront hunger." He called for research and technology that boost the production of food.

Mr Tshianeo Mathidi, the Chairperson of the Vhembe District Farmers Association, expressed the view that the information day was an incredibly significant milestone. However, he revealed that water and land scarcity were twin challenges that continued to hamper farming. As he delivered his message of support, Mr Mathidi noted the need for the government to make sure that it availed land to those who wanted to farm. "Also, as farmers, we need water, there is no farming that can be successfully conducted without water. Nowadays, we cannot rely on rain because of climate change. Due to climate change, we need to change the kind of crops that we are growing. Without support, farming will be difficult for farmers. We really need both the government and community to support us," he emphasised.

This was an information sharing session where amongst others, the University and several stakeholders shared some processes about vendor onboarding, procurement processes and Payment, TAX matters, CIDB, CSD and other reforms. This event took place at the University's current and prospective suppliers, contractors, and service providers.

Key institutions such as the South African Revenue Service (SARS), Construction Industry Development Board and the Limpopo Provincial Treasury, Banks, Accounting and Audit Firms and many other companies attended this event to also give guidance and provide services to current and prospective suppliers who were in attendance.



When welcoming and acknowledging guests, Director: Financial Management and Reporting, Mrs Mavis Madzhie said UNIVEN was hosting this event for the first time.



When giving an overview of the Supplier Open Day, UNIVEN CFO Mr Botwe Kraziya said UNIVEN saw it fit to organise this event because there was a need they wanted to meet with suppliers and organisations such as the South African Revenue Services to educate the suppliers and contractors on how to make sure that their paperwork is in good standing more especially the tax compliance.

Mr Kraziya mentioned that UNIVEN spends more than 600 million annually through procurement and expenditure. He further mentioned that UNIVEN takes care of its people hence it empowers its suppliers. "We are ethical, we don't want people who take bribes or who come here to bribe officials or staff members in exchange of tenders or any supplying job."



The General Manager Provincial SCM from Limpopo Provincial Treasury Department, Mrs B Rakubu spoke about Supply Chain Management Reforms where she highlighted ways to bid with government SCM reforms. She highlighted that, in order to do business with government, prospective suppliers and contractors should choose the right method of procurement for their business and register for tender opportunities on the E-Tender Portal that is available on the National Treasury website.

Mrs Rakubu advised business people to do registrations for themselves, they should not ask other people to register for them because most of them do not submit all necessary documents needed while others don't capture information as requested. She urged the suppliers and contractors to always make sure that they fill in their forms correctly.

She explained the process of registering as suppliers and applying for tenders at UNIVEN. When delivering the Valedictory Lecture under the theme 'Make it happen: Shumela UNIVEN, Shumela Africa,' Senior Prof George's Ekosse, Director Research and Innovation and senior professor in applied Clay Mineralogy and Environmental geology said he has dedicated ten years of his life to the University of Venda, and he dedicated his love to the University of Venda and all his colleagues. He spoke about the 10 years he spent at UNIVEN.

Senior Prof Ekosse explained that Valedictory lecture is an academic term for the highest performing academic departing from an academic institution. He said, "I am not leaving the University of Venda, I am leaving the position. He mentioned that he will forever be an adjunct research Professor at the university of Venda because the University has been very kind to him.

Amongst other things, Senior Prof Ekosse spoke about NRF rated researchers, Adjunct professorship, matters pertaining to ethics, research projects, research publications, national conference support, 771 researchers were funded to attend international conferences during his tenure as the director research and innovation. Research publications output, UNIVEN Technology Transfer, research leadership activities, Limpopo Research Forum, Provincial and national services, networking, partnerships and collaborations, continental service as a leader of the African academy of science, services as an Adjunct professor.

Prof Ekosse further spoke about his services as a senior professor in applied clay mineralogy and environmental Sciences, also about his milestones in the past ten years during his time in UNIVEN. He thanked univen for creating the space to excel in what he loves most.



In his welcome message, DVC Teaching and Learning, Prof Jan Crafford said Prof Ekosse is a distinguished African scholar with leadership in research on the African continent. Prof Crafford mentioned that the term Valedictory has only been used by academics in American and English universities as a final word of advice from a departing academic he is now glad we as Africans are using it now. Prof Crafford explained Senior Prof Ekosse as a scholar who contributed to African science writings.



When introducing Senior Prof Ekosse through contributions to higher Education in Africa, DVC Teaching and Learning from University of KwaZulu Natal, Prof Sandile Songca said it is his honour to be addressing the audience during Senior Prof Ekosse's Valedictory Lecture. He spoke under the theme research leadership in clays and clay minerals in Africa, Prof Songca said Prof Ekosse introduced him to the research on soil which published books on clay minerals in Africa. He said these milestones were achieved with the

contribution of Senior Prof Ekosse. Today these books are being read globally and has benefitted Africans in finding solutions about clay soil. "I am really enthused by the capacity of forward thinking by Prof Ekosse".



When speaking about research leadership in clays and clay minerals in Africa, President Geological Society of Africa Prof Gbenga Okunlola said the valedictory lecture is a celebration of a fulfilled career. He mentioned Prof Ekosse is the most prolific clay researcher in Africa, also that Prof Ekosse remains one of the highest leaders in clay research. Prof Gbenga mentioned that Prof Ekosse has been so well recognized by a lot of African organisations bodies, as he is also a member of many African research organisations.

Prof Gbenga further said Prof Ekosse has also shown research leadership in the fields of clay research collaborations. Many of his publications are co-authored by many African scholars. Prof Gbenga mentioned that Senior Prof has been supervising and grooming young clay researchers across the African continent. "He is the great son of Africa. We congratulate senior Prof for all his contributions and achievements"



When speaking about leadership in Pan African International Research, Prof David Norris, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Botswana mentioned that the new knowledge must be from research at its core. He spoke about research and innovation value chain. He said researchers need to engage at local level before they can even go to the national and international levels. "We need to empower our local communities. We need to impact lives".

Prof Crafford said during COVID-19 pandemic, the University was doing well because like many other universities, UNIVEN shifted its teaching to virtual platforms. "During COVID-19 pandemic, we have learned a lot of things of which we were not even aware. The University is now on the multi-modal teaching approach, but some modules can still be taught online. Online teaching implies engaging with students. Do not just put material online and expect students to do everything by themselves." Prof Crafford said that teaching and learning is one of the aspects of the core business of the university and it should be taken serious like any other core businesses of all universities.



Director CHETL, Dr Lindiwe Mulaudzi said this event was to recognise those who teach and make sure that students are taught and learn. She said her office applauds those who are doing well in the academic field. "We are here to celebrate our lecturers who do their work diligently despite many obstacles. We are also here to celebrate our students who soldier on despite the unfamiliar territories and the challenges that they encounter. Studies illustrate a higher degree of emotional and psychological challenges among our students since the COVID-19 impact. The next question could be: What do we do when we celebrate?"

Dr Mulaudzi said they look back and appreciate where they come from and where they are.

"We introspect our students and lecturers in the programme that will assist us in this regard. We plan forward: We need to remind ourselves of what Alvin Toffler says about the illiterates of the 21st century. He says lilliterates of the 21st century will not be those who cannot read or write but those who cannot learn, unlearn, and relearn.

It is our duty to learn, relearn and unlearn as we plan, and our guest speakers are here to assist us in this regard. We need to appreciate the journey we travelled and where we are today." Dr Mulaudzi invited attendees to imagine where they want to be in the next 15 years.



Ms Munyayi represented students living with disabilities. In her message of appreciation, Ms Munyayi said the most challenging issue for people living with disabilities at UNIVEN is that there are lot of buildings that are still inaccessible on campus. She said the biggest challenge and the University can assist people with disabilities by addressing these challenges but again some of the old buildings were built without people with disabilities in mind. She said recent buildings accommodate them and are easily accessible.





Other students who spoke during the event included Mr Tanganedzani Musandiwa who highlighted the importance of mental-health issues students struggle with. Mr Musandiwa indicated that students come from diverse backgrounds with different challenges such as depression, suicidal thoughts amongst many other mental conditions, which often lead to students resorting to substance use and abuse. Furthermore, he indicated that dealing with mental health issues often requires consistency, patience, and willingness to receive the help on the part of students. He further showed his appreciation for services rendered by SCCDU to support students in need of such assistance



Maswanganyi Matimu Cavin was among other students who were given an opportunity to speak about their experiences at UNIVEN. These students appreciated the

presence of teachers in class. They said this has made their lives easier. They further indicated that tutors should also be taken care of because they contribute towards creating future leaders.



Dr Cebisa Nesamvuni representing Teaching Advancement at Universities (TAU) Fellowship participants indicated that TAU Fellowship currently has seven members. She said TAU Fellowship started in 2015/2016 and takes the form of residential and distance learning and runs from July to June. She outlined all operations of TAU where she indicated that TAU Fellowship project has aligned itself with the academic programme of the University. Its focus is on student support, curriculum development and other academic activities. Only academic staff members with PhD and extensive experience in teaching and learning can be nominated into this programme.



Prof Paul Prinsloo from Unisa said the transformation process in higher education is to redefine educational services. He further indicated that the full potential of these technologies is yet to be discovered, but their impact on teaching and learning is expected to be huge. "This means higher education sector might be affected more than other sectors and education sectors need these technologies earlier than other sectors. We rent these spaces that we use to teach and learn." He indicated that there are owners of these spaces. "We are renting all these online teaching and learning platforms, we don't own them, and we also need to know what is in it for them." Amongst other things Prof Prinsloo discussed the use of social media in



Prof Sheila Matoti from Central University of Technology (CUT) virtually presented about the scholarship of teaching and learning. Amongst other things, Prof Matoti spoke about Centre for Scholarly Teaching (CST); Scholarship of Teaching and Learning; Challenges in Scholarship of Teaching and Learning and creating communities of practice. She proposed collaboration between UNIVEN and CUT on teaching and learning projects.

Faculty of Health Sciences hosts the first Oath-Taking of 187 Health Professionals in Training

The ceremony also serves to remind our outgoing students of their respective responsibility over the patients, clientele, and communities that they will be serving", these were the words by the Acting Executive Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences, Prof Tshilidzi Mulaudzi. The Oath-Taking ceremony took place on Thursday, 08 December 2022 at the University Auditorium.

When the Acting Executive Dean delivered the welcome speech, she indicated that the faculty received approval that the Oath-Taking ceremony should take place outside the graduation ceremony. Furthermore, she alluded that this would enhance serious conscience amongst our students and ensure that they are fully prepared to take up placement and job opportunities immediately after completion.

Prof Mulaudzi informed the guests that they decided to extend oath-taking not only to the nursing students but also to include other allied health professions such as Psychology, Nutrition as well as Biokinetics. She said "We trust that this approach will not be only a mere show-off, but an opportunity for our students to reflect on the responsibilities before them. As she continues, she mentioned that these groups are continuously regulated by professional bodies to ensure discipline among their members. Prof Mulaudzi highlighted that our country and its people deserve committed and ethical leaders and we should be

motivated by our University's motto "creating future leaders". She called on students to refrain from corruption, illtreatment of patients and clients which should be the order of the past. She concluded her welcome remarks by saying "Africa should begin at UNIVEN through Ubuntu practices". She called upon everyone who is a product of UNIVEN to commit to all possible human ethical and professional integrity.



The Interim Deputy Dean of Teaching and Learning, Dr Lindelani Mushaphi outlined the purpose of taking the oath which is to make the students understand their duties and responsibilities as professionals. After this solemn ceremony, it is expected that the students will have greater confidence in caring for their patients and the communities they will serve. The reason for implementing the pledge as an honorable oath for the nurses was to make sure that the ideal nurse is created in front of all so that they can follow the ethical grounds of the field of nursing.

The ceremony was decorated by dignitaries from the University of Venda, representatives from various hospitals, parents as well as students. Prof Sonto Maputle from the Faculty of Health Sciences at UNIVEN made an introduction to the guest speaker.



The guest speaker Ms Aluwani Esther Manenzhe, Acting Allied Health Manager at Tshilidzini Hospital presented a thought-provoking address. She highlighted the significance of the attitude the students should develop towards nursing the sick.

She advised the students that they will be professionals in training for their entire life. She told the students that when they formally enter the world of health scientists, they should remember that they are in the field of science where they solve problems. "We are innovative, and we evaluate the environment and appropriateness of our service", she said. She referred them to the year 2020 which has been a roller coaster year for the whole world. "We have all been in a space where fear, isolation, and threat became a norm, but students had to adjust to new learning methods, studying alone and meeting deadlines". In this process, they dealt with real-life situations such as ESKOM blackouts, connectivity, and online exams . She indicated that in this profession, they served when everyone went into hidina. Healthcare services responded to the health needs of 2020. She further encouraged students to be there when people need them. Ms Manenzhe emphasised that the oath that they are taking symbolises that they will take charge of the challenges they face. "Our success is measured on two things only, how well we respond to the needs and how well our clients experience our service", said Manenzhe.

Ms Manenzhe finally advised the students of a few things when entering the working environment. She talked about the attitude that may impact personal ability to adapt to new environment. Talking about confidence, she encouraged them to always regulate their confidence. "The common saying is that you need to be confident; however, be aware of how your confidence comes across to those you serve and work with. Humility goes a long way in balancing your confidence and competence. You need to build an unquestionable reputation", continued Ms Manenzhe. When it comes to respect, she said, "put value on the client's time and trust. By the time you seek help you will have tried different things. Your client's experience of service will determine how successful your practice is as a professional. It is an honour to welcome you to the health fraternity in South Africa, Be the change you want to see, Serve those you lead, and they will make you their leader", concluded Ms Aluwani Manenzhe.

The Human, animal, and environment interface is very important to predict upcoming human and animal diseases (e.g., Coronavirus and Ebola). One Health in action aims to clearly define roles and responsibilities shared by all the collaborating parties including the University of Venda (UNIVEN) on how to manage human and animal diseases as well as environmental health to be a step ahead of future threats to human, animal, and environmental health as well as pandemics.

Prof N Potgieter, Prof AN Traore, Dr JP Kabue, Dr S Obadire, Dr J Netshipale and two Postdoctoral fellows, Dr E Ledwaba and Dr M Rikhotso, represented the University of Venda during the ERASMUS ELEPHANT project workshops held in the Netherlands and Italy as part of the capacity development of staff and postgraduate students on ONE HEALTH. Workshop topics covered the interface between Animal, Human disease, and Environmental health. The workshop on Capacity development on One Health in Action took place in Europe from 01 - 15 October 2022 in Utrecht (Netherlands) and Bologna (Italy). The workshops were attended by international participants from five (05) institutions in South Africa (Universities of Limpopo, Pretoria, Mpumalanga, and Fort Hare, and the Southern African Wildlife College), and 2 European institutions (Utrecht University in the Netherlands, and the University of Bologna in Italy).

In both workshops, staff and students were divided into interinstitutional multidisciplinary teams, who worked together on issues about: a dequate collection of information/samples, ii. completion of checklists for the assessment of environmental and management health and welfare risks, iii. Interpretation of collected data and performing a health risk analysis and performing associated comprehensive assessments, iv. identification and evaluation of animal health and welfare,

and associated environmental issues, v. conducting field/farm visits and using the knowledge generated to design case studies, vi. designing a Public Awareness Campaign, vii. analysing international funding calls, gathering necessary information, identifying relevant stakeholders and identifying collaborators, and preparing the documents for submission, and viii. analysing the degree of 'One Healthiness' of scientific research.The information and knowledge gained through this opportunity enhanced the way the One Health research group at UNIVEN designed their research projects to obtain information during research projects.

UNIVEN and UL's Faculties of Health Sciences hosted the Second Biennial Health Conference on Sustainable Development Goals under the theme: "Towards the realisation of Sustainable Development Goal 3, Agenda 2030'



The 2nd Biennial Health Research Conference was held from the 21st to the 23rd of September 2022. The conference's main purpose was to emphasize and highlight three core functions of the university which are: teaching and learning, research as well as community engagement were said to underpin the purpose and realisation of the conference including strengthening of the collaboration between the two universities.

This conference was also geared towards ensuring that UL Strategic Plan 2019-2023 Goal 5 which is to "Improve University's research Standing and Status" and UNIVEN Strategic Plan 2021-2025 which focuses on "Engaged Scholarship and Impactful research" benefit both universities economically and provide solutions to local communities. These goals are operational at the faculty level of both universities.

The 2022 Second Riennial Health Conference received 64 oral and 13 poster presentations. The accepted abstracts covered the topics aimed at addressing all targets of SDG 3. The theme was designed for attendees to learn, engage, network, and identify concrete opportunities for research collaborations that would accelerate the achievements of the SDG 3 targets.

She encouraged delegates to engage with the presentations to help people live healthy lifestyles.

In his keynote address, Mr. Nthambeleni Mukwevho, the Provincial Head of Statistics South Africa based in Limpopo Province, mentioned that it is an honor for him to be addressing the Second Biennial Health Conference on the Sustainable Development Goal 3 target themed "Towards realisation of Sustainable Development Goal 3, Agenda

He mentioned that he was delighted to witness the first-hand collaboration between the University of Venda and the University of Limpopo on scientific work to identify opportunities for research collaborations that will accelerate the achievement of targets for Sustainable Development Goal number 3 (SDG 3).

Mr Mukwevho continued to mention that SDG 3 is on ensuring healthy lives and promoting well-being for all at all ages.

He further mentioned that the last SDG She said 193 countries adopted the 2030 country report that was published by Statistics South Africa in 2019 indicated that South Africa had made notable progress in reducing the maternal mortality ratio, the under-5 mortality rate, neonatal mortality rate, and the infant mortality rate. Mr Mukwevho highlighted that the number of HIV-positive infections had also slowed down and the incidence of tuberculosis has declined. Despite this significant progress, the reported incidence of HIV and tuberculosis remained significantly high. None of the SDGs can be achieved by any single entity without the full participation of all social partners and without the research work done at universities.

As the keynote speaker on the second day of the conference, Director of Statistics Support and Coordination at Statistics South Africa (Limpopo Province), Ms. Yvonne Mashele, said in 2015 the United Nations decided to revamp the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) by introducing the SDGs to close the loopholes that existed in the MDGs and to complete the unfinished business of the MDGs and further respond to new challenges

Agenda for Sustainable Development with 17 goals, 169 targets, and 231 indicators as a framework to guide global development for the subsequent fifteen years.
