She is currently pursuing a Masters degree in Social Work at UNIVEN, Munyai is no stranger to adversity. She describes the physical and emotional fatigue that came with every journey between classes. "I sometimes felt frustrated and tired," she recalls. "But with the help from the university's disability unit, I received the support I needed to keep going." Her resilience is grounded in self-belief, strong family support, and a meticulous approach to time management. With a daily schedule, small achievable goals, and regular rest breaks, she has mastered the balance between academic rigor and personal well-being. Rendani attributes much of her drive to a deeper emotional anchor: the loss of her parents at a young age. "I stay focused because I want a better future for myself and to inspire others," she said. Her long-term dream is to become a registered psychologist, working with individuals who are faced with social and emotional challenges, especially those with disabilities. With her BA Honours in Psychology and background in social work, she's already building the foundation for a life dedicated to advocacy and healing.

Her advice to fellow students, especially those living with disabilities, is both simple and profound: "Never be afraid to ask for help. Your condition does not define your future. Stay focused, believe in yourself, and keep pushing forward."

Ms Sithembile Zulu, who hails from Bushbuckridge in Mpumalanga also recently graduated with a Bachelor of Social Work at UNIVEN during the 2025 Autumn Graduation Ceremony. She is now pursuing a BA Honours in Psychology at UNIVEN.

Ms Zulu encountered countless obstacles, from physical inaccessibility to societal scepticism. "People doubted my capabilities," she said. "But I knew what I wanted, and I was not going to let other people's negative thoughts define me." Her family has been her anchor, constantly encouraging her to become the best version of herself. Fuelled by purpose and grounded in faith, she remained committed to her studies, trusting in both her hard work and in divine timing.

"I knew I was not here to play. I had to stay committed and do my best academically while allowing God to do the rest." Her secret to maintaining academic excellence was surrounding herself with positive, goaldriven people who uplift her even in moments of doubt. To students going through a comparable path, she offers invaluable guidance: "Prioritise your studies and don't hesitate to ask for help, whether it's from your lecturers or support structures like the Student Council and Career Development. There's no need to suffer in silence."

Both Rendani and Sithembile indicate that disability is not inability, and that courage paired with community can move mountains. Their stories are not only testimonies of personal triumph but blueprints for others seeking hope, healing, and success. Their voices echo a shared message: You are not alone. You are capable. You are worthy of your dreams.
